My interview with Dr. Matthias Peltz has truly opened my eyes to the career of cardiothoracic surgery, it made me excited for my future and educational path to become a surgeon. This interview began with a brief explanation of what I have done in Independent Study and Mentorship so far, and what I hope to do in Independent Study and Mentorship in the future.

I began the true interview process by asking why Dr. Peltz went into cardiothoracic surgery. Dr. Peltz spoke of his deep interest in transplant, critical care, and cancer; which all drove him to decide on becoming a cardiothoracic surgeon. I was also able to learn a lot about heart transplants through

After better understanding cardiothoracic surgery and Dr. Peltz, I followed with questions related specifically to my Independent Study and Mentorship journey. I first began by asking about postoperative care, since this regarded to my original work research. Dr. Peltz said postoperative care improvements come from less invasive procedures. He also spoke a lot about the importance of a strong care team, something that has been repeatedly reinforced through my research and past interviews. Less wires and chest tubes is also another form of improving post operative care. Physical therapy and removing a patient from it's bed can also dramatically quicken the recovery period after surgery. All of this information added on to my understanding of postoperative care and areas for improvement, allowed me to continue to brainstorm for alternative methods to postoperative care.

Finally Dr. Peltz followed by giving me advice on keeping an open mind to other careers, to continuously learn, and to follow my passion. From this interview I became more confident in speaking to surgeons and am continuously inspired to reach for this challenging career, This interview has also made me confident that the Independent Study and Mentorship program has been the right choice towards my career.
